Message of the President

to Congress

Docamber 2, 1919.

"To the Senate and House of Representatives:

"I hope that Congress will bring to a conclusion at this session logislation looking to the establishment of a budget system. That there should be one single authority responsible for the making of all apprepriations and that appropriations should be unde not independently of each other, but with reference to one single congressive plan of expenditure properly related to the mation's income, there can be no doubt. I believe the burden of preparing the budget must, in the mature of the case, if the work is to be properly done and responsibility ennounted instead of divided, rest upon the executive. The budget so prepared should be submitted to and approved or amended by a single committee of each House of Congress and he single appropriation should be made by the Congress, except much as may have been included in the budget prepared by the executive or added by the particular countries of Congress charged with the budget logislation.

"Another and not less important aspect of the problem is the assertainment of the economy and efficiency with which the moneys appropriated are expended. Under existing law the only audit is, for the purpose of ascertaining whether expenditures have been law-fully made within the appropriations. He one is anthorized or equipped to ascertain whether the money has been spent wheely, economically and effectively. The auditors should be highly trained efficiels with permanent tenure in the French'y Department, free of ebligations to or motives of consideration for this or any subsequent administration, and authorized and empowered to examine into and make report upon the methods employed and the results obtained by the executive dep. Ments of the Government. Their reports should be made to the tengress and to the Secretary of the Treasury."
