1 TITLE I—REVISION OF THE CONGRESSIONAL  
2 BUDGET FOR THE UNITED STATES GOVERN-  
3 MENT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1981

4 SEC. 101. The provisions of this title shall supersede  
5 the figures set forth in the first section and section 2 of H.  
6 Con. Res. 448 of the Ninety-sixth Congress for the fiscal  
7 year beginning on October 1, 1980.

8 SEC. 102. (a)(1) The recommended level of Federal rev-  
9 enues is \$610,900,000,000, and the net amount by which the  
10 aggregate level of Federal revenues should be decreased is  
11 \$2,000,000,000.

14 SEC. 206. The question of indexing is a central part of  
 15 developing Federal fiscal policy. About half the Federal  
 16 budget is subject to indexing either explicitly or implicitly.  
 17 Because of the importance of the indexing question and its  
 18 implication for the process of Federal budgeting, it is the  
 19 sense of the Congress that the leadership of both parties  
 20 should form a bipartisan effort to make a recommendation on  
 21 indexing reform to be implemented no later than fiscal year  
 22 1984.

5 SEC. 301. Pursuant to section 301(b)(2) of the Budget

1   ence, and occasional abuse of public trust in the financial  
2   administration of Federal programs; whereas the General  
3   Accounting Office indicates that, with improved management  
4   in the executive branch, and in some cases, the enactment of  
5   legislation needed to provide stronger administrative proce-  
6   dures, net savings from the President's budget of  
7   \$4,850,000,000 are achievable for fiscal year 1982 and addi-  
8   tional savings of \$6,150,000,000 are achievable for fiscal  
9   years 1983 and 1984, it is the sense of the Congress, that  
10   the newly created Council on Integrity and Efficiency should  
11   prepare comprehensive, long-term plans encompassing at a  
12   minimum debt collection, procurement procedures, resolution  
13   of audit findings, and the other areas of possible budget sav-  
14   ings through improved administrative procedures covered by  
15   the General Accounting Office report to the House Commit-  
16   tee on the Budget, and that necessary legislation to imple-  
17   ment these plans be submitted to Congress no later than  
18   June 1, 1981.
