24 SEC. 206. The question of indexing is a central part of
25 developing Federal fiscal policy. About half the spending-side


1 of the Federal budget is subject to indexing either explicitly
2 or implicitly. On the other hand, Congress has subjected the
3 taxpayer to reverse indexing, whereby Federal taxes rise 1.5
4 per centum for every 1 per centum increase in inflation. It is
5 the sense of Congress that the leadership of both parties
6 should form a bipartisan effort to make recommendations on
7 indexing changes so that the spending side of the budget be-
8 comes more controllable through the budget process and the
9 taxpayers are protected from unlegislated tax increases
10 brought on by inflation. These recommendations should be
11 made in time to be implemented no later than fiscal year
12 1984.
